A message from your Area Delegate

My head is spinning with the number of things that have happened over the last two years. Though I have four months left in my rotation, the experience I've had being your Area Delegate has been incredible. There are not enough words that can describe the honor and gratitude I have for you allowing me to serve.

I wouldn't have believed you if you told me that in the first year of my rotation the General Service Conference, due to the pandemic, would be a virtual event, that all in-person events would come to a sudden stop, that we would be communicating in these little boxes on our computers, and that at my second conference we would be able to meet in person but that it would be hit with a super spreader at the Conference. Still, there have been so many significant events that have changed me for the good. There are also some events that have happened that have left me sad, such as the results of some Advisory Actions, which have caused our beloved Fellowship to have some division, or the way the Conference, in my second year, dealt with the Covid outbreak by not having a contingency plan. But rather then dwell on any negative aspects that have gone on, the truth is that Alcoholics Anonymous has helped so many that have showed up over the last two years, whether it was at limited in-person meetings or mostly on a virtual platform, with an answer for their alcoholism.

I've always liked the saying "the language of the heart" because what I've witnessed over these two years is just that: that alcoholic who has shown up to their first meeting who has the guts to raise their hand and let us know that they are at their first meeting or just coming back, to see people flock around that person and offer help, and to see the chat feature blowing up with phone numbers and encouragement. It is an experience I'm glad I did not miss.

A few things I will cherish are my Conference experiences: the virtual Conference my first year brought about so much fear about being on the computer as long as we had to be, the friendships that were formed with members of my Conference committee and then with other Delegates from around the U.S. and Canada, the long hours of discussions and debates, and seeing the recommendations brought out on to the Conference floor and experiencing the voting process that happens. Probably the most

significant thing that happened, which made me well up unexpectedly, was roll call at both Conferences. Even more emotional were the Delegates farewells at my second Conference. There have been so many relationships and situations that have come about because of the gift of recovery.

I can go on and on with what has transpired over these two years but what really hit me was on my way to Brooklyn for this year's Conference when I decided to drive through my old hometown. I thought of the years of pitiful, incomprehensible demoralization, the years of active drinking and troubles that it had caused me, under the lash of alcoholism I was brought to isolation and homelessness. Now, I was on my way to the General Service Conference serving Area 44 as your Delegate. As I like to see it, I went from the streets to the Conference. Thank you for allowing me to serve. I



Denial

Denial. Those who have been around AA for a little while recognize it for *Don't Even kNow I Am Lying*. That was the watchword for most of my life. I was seldom proactive, mostly reactive, and frequently the reaction was putting my head in the sand. I ignored problems with my marriage, my business, my life in general. I absolutely denied my alcoholism. I denied that daily drinking was not normal. I denied that not everyone had blackouts. I denied that driving while keeping one eye closed was not safe. My self-check on my drinking behavior was those occasional tests found in a newspaper or magazine. I always passed those tests with flying colors. According to them I was the picture of sobriety.

Through a series of events that were absolutely not my fault, I landed in the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous. By the process of quitting the drink, true self-examination, and the Twelve Steps, I began to sort out my flaws and shortcomings. During discussions with my sponsor and network, combined with literature, meetings, and the Big Book, I started to understand my behaviors. My denial was born of my character defects of pride and sloth, which were manifested by procrastination. Marry those with my fears and denial became my way of life. This denial behavior did not abate upon me stopping drinking and bringing AA into my life. I had expected that once I gave up the drink, I would be clothed in the white of perfection. Surprisingly, my defects were still there. I was just more aware of them.

For quite a few years, my physician has been encouraging me to have a colonoscopy. My denial tendency and my Scottish trait of parsimony combined to put it off. About a year ago, certain daily habits changed, but I was not motivated to have this examination. Not wishing to go into many details, things were not moving as they should. My January checkup contained questions about these functions, but I lied and said all was smooth. By March, I was having pain that was at times excruciating, but denial still led the way. By May, the pain and research that a colonoscopy was fully covered by my insurance prompted an appointment. After the procedure, it was found that I had a severe bowel blockage, and that colon cancer was likely. In July, I had about a foot of my colon removed, and it was confirmed that I did have colon cancer. This afternoon, I have my first oncologist appointment. It is there that we will learn the full extent and plan out my path to recovery.

Denial has now taken a back seat to the gifts of this program. Almost anybody who knows me knows that when I first graced the doors of AA that I hated the slogans. They were created by fast talking people for slow thinking persons. As I've been around a little while, I have come to appreciate many of these slogans. The one that I've taken to heart now is "one day at a time." Before I accepted that concept, I spent one half of my day angry at yesterday and the other half of my day afraid of tomorrow. I

never enjoyed the day. Now, at most times, I can enjoy the day. This health challenge has prompted me to focus on what is important. Family, friends, and God. I don't know what the future may bring, but because of the program, I'm able to face it one day at a time, one step at a time, one smile at a time.

Hole in the Donut

I recall the bumper sticker on the car in front of mine while crawling on the Santa Monica Freeway. It was 1983, a little less than ten years before I got sober. Recovery slogans were as foreign to me as the myriad of languages spoken in the city of Los Angeles. In large italic letters, the sticker read: *Higher Powered*. If asked what I thought that meant, I'd have guessed it had something to do with religion. Perhaps it was an advertisement of sorts; a message from the driver of the bumper-stickered car to anyone driving close enough to read it that he and God were in control of the steering wheel.

I didn't care about the driver or his beliefs, nor did I care to think about mine. I was a nice Jewish girl who'd found her solace in the power of pills and alcohol. With a scowl on my face, I passed him and his presumed serenity. My self-centeredness gave rise to the escalating rage I felt about the maddening LA traffic.

Eight years of misery led me to AA. After a few weeks of attending Beginner meetings, my sponsor encouraged me to attend at least one Step meeting a week. I'd gotten Step One down fairly quickly. There was no question of my powerlessness or unmanageability as it related to alcohol use and abuse. But when I walked into the room where the leader was introducing Step Two, I felt a sense of dread. To avoid being called on to read or to share, I found a seat in the very back row, waving off new friends who urged me to move closer to the front. Accustomed to self-sufficiency, I wanted to sit alone. When we finished reading, an aura of ease and comfort seemed to fall upon the other meeting attendees. Audible sighs of relief filled the room. People nodded as one after another shared experiences with Hail Mary's, obligatory service as altar boys, the strict rules of catechism, and the fear and upset associated with what appeared to be the punishing god of their collective youth. Most had attended Catholic School and, if my memory serves me, most referred to their Higher Power as God or Jesus.

On the wall, just behind the leader, was a hand-carved, ornate wooden crucifix. I shouldn't have been surprised by this, since the meeting was held in a church, but the symbol itself fueled my mounting anxiety. It was obvious I didn't belong. I forced myself not to run out of the room. When everyone locked hands and the Lord's Prayer was recited verbatim by all in attendance but me, I left the meeting in tears.

For the remainder of the month of February, we continued to read and discuss Step Two. I showed up but continued to cry the instant I got in my car. By the third or fourth time I'd heard it read, I didn't bother waiting until the meeting was over. I just cried throughout the reading and throughout the sharing. As connected as I was to the friends I'd made in these warm and welcoming church basements, I regularly questioned how I would find a higher power. I recall thinking I'd never be restored to sanity. If I'd thought I was different before coming to AA, I was just as different now. But as dissimilar as I felt, I was determined to find spiritual security. I figured if I wasn't receiving demerits for crying, I could keep attending Step Two meetings.

My sponsor, along with many friends in AA, tried to explain the difference between religion and spirituality to me. An old-timer shared her simple take on Steps 1, 2 and 3: Came, Came To, Came to Believe. I was directed to pages 569-570 in the Big Book and read and reread the description of the spiritual experience as a shift in perspective, a personality change sufficient to bring about recovery from alcoholism. I appreciated Herbert Spencer's quote about "contempt prior to investigation," but I wasn't contemptuous or even unwilling to believe. I just felt stymied.

My best friend, a practicing Catholic, was the most understanding. "If you're not ready to connect with a higher power that is personal to you, use the group of drunks (GOD) or the good orderly direction (GOD) you receive from the people in the rooms. And," she continued, "if you find your faith lacking, you can borrow mine." Her warm gesture meant, and still means, everything to me.

For six months, I attended meetings regularly, spoke with my sponsor daily, connected with women in my network, kept a regular coffee commitment, and followed the suggestions. I had not yet found a power greater than myself, but I trusted that if all of the people I'd grown to love and admire had found one, then I could too. It was mid-September and my family was observing the High Holidays, a time of thoughtful and honest reflection of the year that had passed and an acknowledgment and subsequent repentance for sins committed against ourselves and others. I sat between my parents in their temple as they prayed and meditated, reciting and chanting both silently and in communion with other members of their congregation. At times, one or the other began to weep, perhaps in memory of someone they'd lost or maybe because of a deep spiritual connection that each of them had nurtured and developed. I recall feeling awed and envious.

After the rabbi's meaningful sermon, I considered my circumstances. I had made an utter mess of my life. I was 30 years old, living in the home of my parents, unfit to work, borrowing money for gas and the collection basket at meetings, and surviving on my monthly welfare and food stamp stipend that was scheduled to expire at month's end. Self-reliance had gotten me nowhere. I regularly felt alone and afraid.

With respect to the Jewish calendar, this moving service of reflection would lead me, in just one week, to atone for my sins and ask God for forgiveness—the same forgiveness we asked of God at the end of every AA meeting in the Lord's Prayer. Was I really that different from everyone else? If our program was truly spiritual, not religious, what was holding me back from connecting with a God of my understanding that was personal to me? "It doesn't matter who your Higher Power is," my sponsor told me, "as long as it's not you."

I spent many an afternoon in my parents' rabbi's study trying to make sense of what I believed. It turns out many of our Steps had loose connections to the practices and rituals I'd grown up with. Making the parallels was helpful. I knew that a life run on self-will would keep me restless, irritable and discontent, isolated from my fellows, and ultimately lead back to the bottle. My resistance was keeping me stuck. I just needed to make a beginning.

It's been a long time since I sat in a Step Two meeting and cried. AA is roomy and all-inclusive. I no longer feel different or separate or isolated. The church basements I frequent regularly have become sacred spaces for me. I know now that the only one who'd gotten in the way of my coming to believe was me. With surrender came peace. Taking Step Two took time, but in letting go, I've found myself.
